It allows us to think about all those people who suffer in wars all around the world. It reminds us how important it is to work for peace.

Parking



We still have a small but significant number of drivers who are parking illegally, causing great disruption to the local roads and putting our children's lives at risk.

To be clear, we do not expect to see any Pinner Park Parents parking on the yellow zig-zags outside school during the times when parking is restricted.

We have asked Harrow Council and the local police to patrol as frequently as possible to enforce this.

Additionally, there is an area outside the school which is restricted to drivers with disabilities, who display a blue badge. If other drivers park in this area, some of our parents with blue badges are unable to drop their children safely at school. Please do not park in this area unless you have a blue badge.



Morning Entry into School – Years 3 - 5



We operate a 'soft start' to school for our older children. This means that children can come into school any time between 8.45am and 8.55am. We do this because it is a calmer start to the day, and also gives some flexibility to parents who are dropping off other children.

In operating a 'soft start' we hope to reduce the need to queue, and avoid the difficulties associated with getting so many children into school at the same time.

Even with a 'soft start' we still have quite a gathering of children in the morning which has caused some difficulty for other children and parents to navigate around the playgrounds. To resolve this, we are now asking children to line up alongside the school building to leave the route around the school clear for others.
