Attendance: Every Day Counts!

As you know, excellent attendance is vital in order for children to do well at school. This is why we are setting an attendance target of 96%. This reflects the national attendance for primary schools in England.

We expect every child to achieve an attendance rate of at least 96% (and some will have higher attendance). That means they should be absent for no more than 7 days over this year.

We know that most of our families try very

hard to make sure their child's attendance is good. However, there are some children with poor attendance records whose education is being damaged as a result. We will communicate with families whose child's attendance is below the expected level so that we can work together to make improvements.

Every year, flu kills thousands of people. The immunisation programme helps protect children against flu, which can be a very unpleasant illness and lead to complications like bronchitis and pneumonia. The flu vaccine also helps to prevent transmission of flu to the wider community, including older family members and newborn babies who may have weaker immune systems. Research by Public Health England has shown that the flu vaccine programme has reduced illness and the numbers of people visiting their GP with flu. It has also reduced the number of hospital admissions and emergency department attendances among the children and the wider population.

There have been a number of occasions recently where parents have been late to collect children from after-school clubs. Please make every effort to collect your child on time. Advance Warning - Christmas Cards – A Card for the Class



Our Christmas Post Boxes will open on Monday 2 December, with a last delivery on Wednesday, 18 December.

All cards intended for classes or staff at the school should be distributed in this way.

We ask that children write <u>one card to their class</u>, rather than individual cards. We will reserve some time each day to open the cards, read them out, and then hang them up in the classroom for everyone to see. <u>Please do not send in cards for individual students</u> as we will be unable to distribute them.

This will not only relieve some pressure on busy families, but will also reduce the amount of paper and cards used at this time of year. By setting aside a short time each day to open and read the cards together, we will ensure that the spirit of card-giving at Christmas is honoured and valued. The staff team will be doing likewise, and making a donation to charity in place of purchasing hundreds of cards.

Please address your card(s), "To everyone in ..." (for example, 'to everyone in 3-Birch'). We'll also have a display of cards in the staff rooms for any cards addressed, 'To all the staff'.

Headlice – an irritating pest – please keep checking!

Headlice is a problem that affects all of us. This troublesome pest is a widespread and unpleasant infection, especially among school age children. A common misconception is that they are a symptom of poor hair hygiene - rest assured this is not true. Lice are equally likely to be found on clean or dirty hair!

Head lice cannot jump, hop or fly. Children can get head lice from sustained head to head contact when playing together, whispering, hugging or when they are in close contact. At any one time, most schools will have a few children with active living head lice. This can be between 2 - 5%. It is rarely higher than this.



The only way to eradicate the problem is if every single one of us is vigilant. Please check your children's hair this weekend with a fine toothed inspection comb. The recommended method is to 'wet-comb' conditioned hair. If you are concerned, please contact your local pharmacist who will offer advice.

Please check your children's hair regularly (at least weekly) and ensure that all long hair is tied back. You may also wish to brush your child's hair each afternoon when he or she returns from school – this will prevent any louse which has wandered onto your child's head during the day from laying eggs and becoming a more significant problem.
