Year 3 and Year 4 Christmas Music Performance



News in Brief

Fruit snacks: Children in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 are asked to bring in a fruit or vegetable snack to eat at playtime. We do not permit any alternatives to fruit or vegetable (for example; biscuits, crisps, Frubes or Fruit flakes).





Christmas Jumper Day: We're supporting Save the Children this year by taking part in Christmas Jumper Day. We're choosing to do this on Wednesday 18 December to tie in with Christmas Lunch day. Please send the £1 in to school with your child – class teachers will collect the money at registration.

Christmas Lunch: Our Christmas Lunch will be on Wednesday 18 December. We may have a much bigger take-up of school meals on that day, so we need to plan in advance and place a larger order with Chartwells. Please order your child's lunch on <u>Parent Pay</u> by Friday 13 December.

Christmas Cards: Our Christmas Post Boxes are now open. We ask that children write <u>one card to their class</u>, rather than individual cards. We will reserve some time each day to open the cards, read them out, and then hang them up in the classroom for everyone to see. <u>Please do not send in cards for individual students</u> as we will be unable to distribute them. Thank you.

Times Tables Rockstars and Numbots

We have two fantastic online resources to help children to learn and practice their mathematics at home.

<u>Times Tables Rockstars</u>, which is available for all children in Year 2 – 6, is a carefully sequenced programme of daily times tables practice. From the start, children practice times tables alongside the associated division facts. Children are encouraged to become more and more accurate, as well as faster and faster so that their knowledge of these facts become automatic. As well as the online portal, there are apps available for different devices. We'd like every child to work towards becoming a Rock Star!



<u>Numbots</u>, also from the team who created Times Tables Rock Stars, is a highly engaging platform for learning to add and subtract. We are making this available for children up to Year 2. NumBots is all about every child achieving the 'triple win' of understanding, recall and fluency in mental addition and subtraction, so that they move from counting to calculating.



Both platforms will help children to make rapid progress in these areas of mathematics – please encourage your child to have a short play each day. The 'little and often' approach really works! Please don't be tempted to give your child the answers – the platform is designed to move the children on at the right pace, with plenty of repeat practice, and we don't want things to get too challenging too soon. Remember: practise makes progress!

Your children's log in details have been stuck into their reading record books. Let's see if everyone can get started this weekend!

Ready, Respectful, Safe and Kind – Everyone and Everywhere!
