Word	Meaning
camouflage	Hide the object in its surroundings so it won't be recognised.
collage	A picture made from sticking pieces of paper or cloth onto paper
evaluate	What have you done? What might you change next time?
overlapping	One shape partly stuck over another shape
patterns	Lines, shapes or colours that are repeated to create a pattern
Pointillism	Using small dots to cover an area and create an image
shapes	The outlined area
textures	How something feels: – bumpy, rough, jagged
tones	How light or dark an object is



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#### **Pointillism**

**Pointillism** is a style of art where an image is created by using many tiny dots of colour to build up the picture.





The colour (paint or ink) can be applied using all sorts of different tools.







Pastels, felt tips, and paint can be used to create pointillist pictures.

## Collage

The pieces can overlap each other or form layers over the top of others.



**Collage** is when an image is created by sticking pieces of coloured paper or fabric onto a background to create an image.





Pieces with different patterns, shapes, tones and textures can be used to create an interesting image.
