Andy Warhol liked to use very bright bold colours. He used screen printing to produce lots of images based on famous celebrities, like Marilyn Monroe. She was a very famous film star.



Roy Lichtenstein created cartoon designs. He became famous for his colourful pop art paintings and comic book style.







He was the creator of the "Pop Art"

movement.

- Stretch and skew




With digital art, you do not have to worry about wasting valuable paint or other materials. Also, if you are not happy with the image you have created, it is really easy to start again or to simply undo.
